For example, Aa, Ae, Ai, $\mathrm{Ao}, \mathrm{Au}, \mathrm{Ba}, \mathrm{Be}$, etc. In the margins, James would write his topic, author's last name, or name of a book and then quote or comment on it to the right. Entries referencing Schopenhauer, for instance, appear on p. Mu under "Mysticism" to the right of which appears II. 699 ffg., as well as p. No under "Noumena" with II, 217-18 written to the right. James is citing page numbers from volume II of Die Welt als Wille und Vorstellung.
